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## Charitable Donations

Most of us struggle to earn a decent amount, spend a reasonable amount, and save and invest a prudent amount. Unless we plan, charitable giving can get short shrift. I recently read an article that quoted the medieval philosopher, Moses Maimonides, who identified eight grades of Charity:

1. To give reluctantly;
2. To give cheerfully, but not adequately;
3. To give cheerfully and adequately, but only after being asked;
4. To give cheerfully, adequately, and of your own free will, but to put it in the recipient's hand in such a way as to make him feel lesser;
5. To let the recipient know who the donor is, but not the reverse;
6. To know who is receiving your charity but to remain anonymous to him;
7. To have neither the donor nor the recipient be aware of the other's identity;

To dispense with charity altogether, by enabling your fellow humans to have the wherewithal to earn their own living.

I believe the most relevant question is: "How to get

started, and when?"

One strategy that we've seen which addresses the "how" is using life insurance to fund charitable bequests at death. Many people use the gifting of life insurance proceeds as part of their tax and estate planning since proper structuring can allow them to claim the life insurance premium or the resulting death benefit as a tax deduction.

As the Government gets more and more reluctant to issue charitable status to organizations which do not meet all their requirements, we'll find people going beyond the tax structure incentives and just use life insurance as a gift to non-charities.

Organizations like ours, SSCAAT, are registered as not-for-profit organizations. Unfortunately, we do not as yet have Canadian charitable status since 100% of our mandate is to support the old school in Guyana by raising funds in Canada. However, it does not preclude anyone from naming the SSCAAT as a beneficiary or partial beneficiary of a life insurance policy. Please consult your life insurance agent or financial advisor for further details.

Alfred Thomas Abdool (I won't say what the 'P' stands for – SMILE), we met in groups of 3, 4, 5, 12, etc., dozens and dozens of times during the year starting back in January. Introducing....

**DR. HAROLD RAMPERSAUD**

*Over the years, the members of the Toronto Association Executive have been known only as names to the alumni with whom we communicate. In an effort to make us better known, we are starting a series of articles which will introduce our Executive members, especially those who have joined us most recently.*

**Harold St. Clair Rampersaud** was born on 14 Dec., 1933, and attended Sacred Heart Catholic Primary (Main St.) School from 1941 to 1948, successfully obtaining his School-leaving Certificate. He then moved on to St. Stanislaus College where he was active in sports, running the mile (though he could never beat his main rival, Maurice Phillipe) and playing the position of goalkeeper on the College and the Combined (with Queens) Colleges football teams. He also enjoyed learning the works of Shakespeare as taught by Fr. Earle S.J., and passed eight subjects at the GCE Ordinary Level in 1952.

Harold left Br. Guiana in 1953 to attend the Jesuit school of St. Louis University, Missouri, U.S.A., from which he graduated in 1957 with a B.Sc. degree, majoring in Philosophy. He then returned to St. Stanislaus College where he taught Biology for one year.

From 1958 to 1964, he attend the University College of the West Indies at the Mona campus in Jamaica, and successfully completed his medical studies, graduating with the M.B., B.S. (London) degrees. To complete his internship, he moved to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Bridgetown, Barbados, where he became the House Officer by 1966.

Deciding to expand his horizons, Harold joined the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Medical Services in 1966, from which he eventually retired in 2001. During the course of his stay in St. Vincent, he was involved as an Advisor on and the Administrator of Government health policies and other associated matters and, in these roles, has traveled extensively throughout the world, including the Caribbean, Europe, the Middle East, and the far East (including Hong Kong and Taiwan). He also has represented the Government at WHO and PAHO conferences in U.S.A., Switzerland, the Caribbean, and Guyana.

In local matters, Harold acted as the personal physician to the Prime Ministers of the country, as well as to the Judges of the State and Eastern Caribbean Circuit. In addition, he was appointed to attend to all the Caribbean Prime Ministers and Ministers of Health at a Caribbean Conference held at the famous villa complex of Canouan Beach Resort in the Grenadines. He also worked as the only medical doctor to attend, on request, to all visiting Hollywood and rock stars, including Mick Jagger, and administered medi-

cal services to many other well-known persons, including H.R.H. the late Princess Margaret of the U.K., who owned a villa on the island of Mustique. He was appointed Chief Medical Officer, a post he held from 1990 until his retirement in 2001.

Harold held the position of President of the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Family Planning Association for four years, and also was the President of the Canadian Save the Children Fund (St. Vincent branch) for eight years. In recognition of all the valuable services which he had rendered to the public, he was awarded the O.B.E. in 1996.

Harold currently resides in Toronto and joined the Association (and was elected to the Executive) in September 2007 when he first heard about it from a former school-mate. He since has met or has been in contact with many of his colleagues from his Saints school days, but is still trying to contact Roy V. DeSouza, Michael Teesdale, and Cedric Hing. Anyone knowing the whereabouts of these alumni are asked to pass on this information to us.


